Graduate Corner — Jace Chamberlin

Babe Ruth Leaguer Jace Chamberlin Keeps Baseball Odyssey Going with Fullerton

JACE CHAMBERLIN, a graduate of the Visalia, California Babe Ruth League, caught our eye when he participated in the 2011 and 2012 Cal Ripken World Series. He set a record for batting averages with a .800, for most strike -outs with 18, threw a no-hitter (coming close to throwing a perfect game), captured the Most Outstanding Player and Batting Title Awards, and participated on a team that won back-to-back World Series.

Jace arrived at Redwood High heralded vouth baseball player ever to come out Visalia. of which has produced first-round picks draft (such Aaron Hill and Beau Mills), All-Stars (Mike LaCoss and Stephen Vogt) and a

World Series champion (Bobby Ojedga).

And in his first varsity at-bat as a 14-year-old freshman, Chamberlin showed what all the hype was about, crushing an opposite-field double off the left-center-field fence on an 0-1

pitch from Clovis North's Duke-bound right-hander Jack Labosky, The Bee's Outstanding Pitcher of the season in 2014, during the Coca-Cola Classic.

"When he came up, there was a feeling in the air," Redwood coach Dan Hydash said. "I remember even the kids on the team were pumped to see him hit because he was so special. They were like, 'Wow, he's the real deal."

The 6-foot-3, 270-pound left-handed hitting senior first baseman hasn't stopped crushing since, earning a scholarship to national power Cal State Fullerton.

Chamberlin celebrated his choice in front of family and friends, and alongside college-bound Redwood teammates Parker Cantrell (Fresno Pacific), Chris Gonzalez (Antelope Valley) and Vincent Pratti (Antelope Valley) during a campus ceremony on National Signing Day.

"I'm really excited. It's a good opportunity," said Chamberlin, who also drew college recruiting interest in football from Arizona of the Pacific-12 Conference after a standout sophomore season as an offensive lineman before giving up the sport to focus on baseball. "I went there on a visit and fell in love with the school. The academics fit me perfectly, and the program was great. It all fit me well. I'm ready to hop in there and be a Titan."

Hydash said Fullerton, traditionally a factory of pro prospects, had targeted Chamberlin for two years before he signed with the Titans in November.


At the time of his signing, Fullerton's coaching staff commented that Chamberlin "is a very physical hitter that shows tons of power potential and could be a middle-of-the-order hitter for years to come."

That power potential has caught the attention of professional scouts, too.

Chamberlin likely will be selected in the major-league draft in June, according to Hydash.

And that will present a challenging decision for the 17-year-old who has been groomed for a baseball career by his father, Mark, since his youth.

"I'm just sitting back and hoping for the best," Chamberlin said. "If college works out, college is awesome. If the draft happens to come into play, I'll have a long talk with my family and see what's going on."



As youth, Chamberlin got an up-close look Visalia a t professionals such Hill, as Mills, Vogt and Shane Costa as they trained his father's Chamberlin Baseball Academy.

"He was brought

up around all those guys," Mark Chamberlin said. "Jace was practically born there. He was under tables listening to hitting lessons all his life."

Chamberlin is coming off a Bee Fab 50 and firstteam All-West Yosemite League junior season when hit .408 he with 14 doubles, five home runs, 33

RBIs, 24 runs



and a .504 on-base percentage for a Rangers team that went 23-8 and beat Tehachapi 14-4 in the D-II final. .


As a sophomore, Chamberlin hit .381 with 12 doubles, five homers and 36 RBIs to lead Redwood to a 28-7 record and a 4-0 win over Hanford for the D-II title. Chamberlin as a freshman hit .356 with eight doubles, two homers and 17 RBIs as the Rangers went 19-13 and reached the D-II semifinals.

"Every once in a while in your lineup, you get lucky if you have a difference maker," Hydash said. "He's a special hitter. He's one of those guys with great discipline. He always has a plan up there.

He's going to be very successful down the road. He just has to keep that good work ethic up."

Jace has made the Babe Ruth League program proud. He plays the game with integrity, and with an intensity to compete and lead by example, both on and off the field.

Mario Moccia, Director of Athletics


Babe Ruth League Alumnus Mario Moccia returned to his alma mater as the 23rd Director of Athletics at New Mexico State University after serving for nine years as the Director of Athletics at Southern Illinois University in Carbondale. The 2015-16 athletic season was highlighted with five student-athletes being honored as All-Americans. Football sophomore Larry Rose III was selected to the Associated Press Third Team, volleyball senior Gwen Murphy was named an American Volleyball Coaches Association Honorable Mention and men's basketball sophomore Pascal

Siakam was an AP Honorable Mention as well as a first round draft pick of the Toronto Raptors. Baseball had two All-Americans as junior center fielder Daniel Johnson was named to the American Baseball Coaches Association Third Team, while pitcher Kyle Bradish was named to the Louisville Slugger All-Freshmen Team.

With Moccia at the helm, the Aggies made several facility upgrades during the 2015-16 academic year. Presley Askew Field installed a state-of-the-art synthetic grass infield. In addition, the baseball stadium saw renovations to its bullpens and batting cages as well as construction of a new press box and field turf. The swimming and diving team is enjoying the new Wanda Glass Swimming and Diving Locker Room as well as new coaches offices, while Aggie Memorial Stadium received a major upgrade with the addition of Club 27. NM State has also continued to excel in the classroom since Moccia took the reigns as all athletics teams surpassed an Academic Progress Rate of 930. Two teams, women's golf and women's tennis, achieved a perfect 1,000 APR.

A member of the US Bank New Mexico State Hall of Fame inducted in 1998, Moccia was the captain of the Aggie baseball team. He was twice honored as the Aggies MVP and won a team triple crown (leader in batting average, home runs and RBI). He was selected by the Detroit Tigers in the 1989 Major League Baseball draft, and played two seasons in the Tigers minor league system before entering athletic administration.



Babe Ruth League Alumni Association Helps Local League that Suffers Extensive Loss and Damage from Tornado

At least four people were killed in southern Mississippi recently when a destructive tornado roared through the Hattiesburg area, leveling homes, ripping off roofs and tossing trees into roadways across the region. As dawn broke, residents awoke to find trees, massive limbs and poles wrapped in power lines littering the streets next to decimated and severely damaged homes. Nearly 15,000 homes and businesses were without power.

A member of the Babe Ruth family, the Petal Babe Ruth League, sustained a lot of damage to their complex, and lost one of the equipment sheds, due to the destructive weather. Not knowing what insurance will cover, they are currently looking at \$80,000 worth of damage to their complex and about \$15,000 in equipment loss.

The Petal Babe Ruth League serves 700+ kids, and they are slated to host the 13-15 regional tournament this summer. They are doing their best to make repairs to get the season started and expect to be making repairs throughout the season to get ready for the tournament.

The Babe Ruth League Alumni Association places a high priority on assisting leagues that experience extensive loss due to destructive weather conditions, and was happy to send funds to the Petal Babe Ruth League to use towards covering the damages not covered by insurance.

Baseball and softball are about teamwork, and clearly it is going to take *team by team*, *fan by fan, neighbor by neighbor* to provide comfort to the youth of Petal by making sure they have some type of normalcy restored by being able to play the great game of baseball during the 2017 season.





BABE RUTH LEAGUE GRADUATES MAKE THEIR MARK ON THE WORLD

KURT WARNER VOTED INTO PRO FOOTBALL HALL OF FAME

Kurt Warner, a graduate of the Cedar Rapids Metro, Iowa Babe Ruth League, just added a new ending to his storybook football career. The retired quarterback was one of five modern-day candidates voted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Kurt is a former American football quarterback, a part-time TV football analyst, and a philanthropist. He played for three National Football League (NFL) teams: the St. Louis Rams, the New York Giants, and the Arizona Cardinals. Off the field, he and his wife, Brenda, who have seven children, have devoted their lives to serving others. Thousands continue to benefit from their outreach initiatives.



Kurt Warner's football career has proven to be of the more improbable rags-to-riches stories ever to come out of the sports world. Bypassed by the big Division I colleges, and at one point working the graveyard shift stocking shelves at a supermarket so he could stay in football shape during the day, Warner, a 28-year-old no-name back-up, catapulted to stardom in 1999. During his second full year in the NFL, he drove a high-powered St. Louis Rams offense to a Super Bowl victory, and collected MVP honors along the way. Over the ensuing decade, Warner captained two other teams to the Super Bowl, registered another MVP season, and threw for more than 200 career touchdowns.

His journey from working the aisles of a grocery store to winning two NFL MVP awards serves as a reminder to never stop pursuing your dreams. Kurt Warner is a great role model for today's youth.

They see more than athletic brilliance. They see an athlete who played the game with gratitude, hustle and enthusiasm.



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Gibbons Retires as Executive Director



Michael Gibbons, after serving 35 years as the only Executive Director of the Babe Ruth Birthplace & Museum, has decided to retire from his post.

Gibbons welcomes his longtime colleague and friend Shawn Herne as the new Executive Director. Gibbons will be staying involved as Director Emeritus & Historian, overseeing all curatorial, archival and exhibit development projects.

In the early 1980's, the building that housed the Babe Ruth Museum (which was the building in which Babe was born) was fighting demolition, when Gibbons, originally a historian and documentary producer, agreed to become involved in turning the Babe Ruth Museum around.

Over the course of a year, Mike's turn-around of the Museum was already apparent and they asked him to stay on as Executive Director. What was supposed to be a temporary position, turned into a career.

Over time, through the efforts of Mike and his dedicated staff, the Museum's Board of Directors, local and state government and other passionate Babe Ruth fans, the Museum has been preserved and interest, as well as exhibits, have flourished.

More than 100 years after he debuted, Babe Ruth continues to astonish, as much or more a cultural icon as a baseball figure. He accomplished the almost-unfathomable feats when he was playing. These feats that people, if they hadn't seen them, they wouldn't believe. Stuff that seemed superhuman in his time, and as time passes, and

those legends and stories are handed down, they still amaze us.

When it comes to Babe Ruth, it can be hard to separate the myth from reality.

Michael Gibbons is one of the most passionate historians who cares about Ruth's real-life legacy. The Museum expends ample energy telling Ruth stories. The 714 home runs. The 60 blasts in the 1927 season. The seven championships. The three home runs for "Little Johnny Baseball." But what sets the museum apparat are the smaller items, the actual relics of a once-ordinary man. Here you can see the room where Ruth was born. The rosary he prayed. His hymnal. Envelopes he addressed.


"We're storytellers," said Gibbons. "We use artifacts to interpret the life of Babe Ruth and tell stories about Babe Ruth."

Still, in at least one way, it's a jarring collection, almost discordant. To see something that Ruth touched is to acknowledge that Ruth was actually real, that he existed, that he inhabited the same Earth on which we now ride. There's more, of course. You can see the bat Ruth wielded, which is heavier than anything in use today. There's a jersey he wore at St. Mary's Industrial School for Boys, signed balls, near-priceless baseball cards and other artifacts from a legendary career.

Babe Ruth League and the Alumni Association is sincerely grateful to Michael Gibbons as we believe there is no other atmosphere that does justice to Babe Ruth's life than at the Babe Ruth Birthplace and Museum. And we are honored that he will be staying on as Director Emeritus & Historian to ensure the Museum continues to be a leader in the sports heritage industry.




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There are many legends associated with St. Patrick, or the "Apostle of Ireland" He was born around 460, and by the 600s, he was already known as the Patron Saint of Ireland. The symbol of the shamrock used for St. Patrick's Day comes from the story of St. Patrick using the shamrock to illustrate the Holy Trinity. Another popular belief is that St. Patrick banished the snakes from Ireland. The story says that while St. Patrick was fasting, snakes attacked him, so he chased all the snakes into the ocean. (Since snakes often represent evil in literature, when Patrick drives the snakes out of Ireland, it is symbolically saying he drove the old, evil pagan ways out of Ireland and brought in a new age.) One legend has St. Patrick sticking a walking stick into the ground while evangelizing, which turned into a tree. These tales and others were likely spread by well-meaning monks centuries after St. Patrick's death.

This March holiday signals the start of spring for many. Feasting on the day features traditional Irish food, including corned beef, corned cabbage, coffee, soda bread, potatoes and shepherd's pie. Many celebrations also hold an Irish breakfast of sausage, black and white pudding, fried eggs, and fried tomatoes. Other common traditions include: parades, drinking, dying water or beer green, wearing green, religious services, and pea planting (in the Northeast, many celebrate by planting peas—this is largely due to the color and time of year, prime pea-planting conditions).

Corned Beef and Cabbage Recipe



Ingredients: 2 gallons chicken stock; 1/2 cup pickling spice; 6 cloves garlic; 4 bay leaves; 4 cloves, 2 pounds raw beef brisket, 2 heads of cabbage, cut into wedges; salt and freshly ground pepper; vegetable oil for frying; and 3 medium Idaho potatoes, cut into wedges.

<u>Directions:</u> Pour the stock into a large 4-gallon pot over medium-high heat and bring to a simmer. Add the pickling spice, garlic, bay leaves and cloves. Reduce heat to medium, then add the beef and cabbage. Simmer until

tender, 3 hours. Season with salt and pepper.

Heat a few inches of oil to 325 degrees in a deep pot. Fry the potato wedges until tender, 6 to 7 minutes. Remove and season with salt and pepper.

To build the plate, place wedges of cabbage on a plate with corned beef next to it, then add potatoes and finish with 2 to 3 ounces of the cooking broth on top.











FRIENDS we will miss...

IRBY JOSEPH LUQUETTE, 90, of Abbeville,



Louisiana, passed away on December 25, 2016. Irby had two loves in his life—his family and baseball. And the two were intimately intertwined.

Irby was a fixture at the ballpark, Alabama, passed away first as a father and baseball coach for his sons, and then later just because baseball was a part of who

he was. He shared his love of the game of baseball with Babe Ruth League participants for over 62 He positively shaped the lives of many youngsters, serving as a coach, manager, umpire, League President, District Director, Commissioner, Regional Commissioner, Tournament Director and World Series consultant. Many times, parents of children that benefitted from Irby's involvement in Babe Ruth League programs would thank him for his encouraging impact on their children.


In addition to being involved with Babe Ruth at the local league, state and regional levels, Irby served numerous terms as a Tournament Director for many District, State and Regional Tournaments. As well, Irby served on the first Abbeville World Series committee and was very instrumental in bringing the 1974 Babe Ruth 13-15 World Series to Abbeville. This was the very first tournament to show a profit, also breaking the record for attendance at that time. Plus, Irby helped prepare the Abbeville facility for the first Bambino World Series to be hosted in Louisiana in 1995.




